It's time for the 2nd Annual South-Eastern Washington Inspired Quilt show (SEWIQ), sponsored by Discount Vac & Sew. DVS is allying with the South Columbia Creative Arts Festival and covering the downtown Kennewick area with quilts on Saturday, September 24th, 2022, from 10am-3pm.

As we emerge from the pandemic, we have a chance to get back out and see quilts up close and in person. Here's a chance to see some quilts, and to support local businesses.

DVS needs **quilts** and **volunteers**. Ginny Hildreth visualizes 100 quilts covering downtown. If you have a quilt you would like to enter into the show, DVS will accept quilt entries starting September 15th; registration closes on September 21st. During the show, be sure to vote for your favorite Scrap Bag challenge quilt.

2023 Quilt Show News

2023 Quilt Show Challenge — ILLUSION QUILTS —

The 2023 Quilt Show challenge has been announced! Entries for the challenge must reflect an **ILLUSION**. Examples include:

- A 3D effect created by the use of color, value, or shape (e.g. tumbling blocks).
- Transparency: use color and value to create the illusion that one fabric is showing through another fabric overlapping it.
- Piecing that gives the impression of movement, hidden images, flashing and vibration, patterns, or alternatively, of swelling or warping.
- ◆ An optical illusion (e.g. an Escher drawing).

Any shape, any fabric, any embellishment is allowed, but all entries must reflect the theme of ILLUSION.



There is no minimum size. Maximum circumference is 180 inches. All entries must be 3 layers (held together by quilting or tying) and have finished edges.



Entries are due by March 1, 2023. Drop off locations TBA later.



Remember to keep your project a secret - voting will be held at the March 2023 meeting. Winners will be announced at the quilt show. Have fun!

Susan Smith, Guest Featured Artist 2023

Susan grew up in northern BC, Canada, in a community reminiscent of the pioneer days with no electricity or indoor plumbing. In those cold winters, sleeping under a handmade quilt with wool batting from the family sheep was the ultimate luxury. Those hard-working close knit days shaped her faith and family, which remain the source of joy in her life today.

Susan grew up making garments and quilts alongside her mother. She used all the traditional quilting methods - tracing templates with a ballpoint pen, cutting with scissors, and quilting on a room-size frame. She branched out into a rotary cutter, but made very few quilts until her children were well



into high school. By that point she had inherited all her mom's scraps, and found she loved using mixed fabrics for a scrappy feel, but increasingly was drawn to more contemporary settings that offer plenty of room for playing with shapes and designs.

In early 2015, a friend invited Susan to play on her longarm quilting machine for an afternoon. Just a few hours in, she absolutely knew this was the dream job for her. She purchased a used longarm, named her Lucy, and never looked back. She's quilted over 1100 projects to date, and freehand edge-to-edge work is her favorite. These days she teaches the art of freehand quilting through online courses and memberships, plus has a podcast (Measure Twice, Cut Once), all about crafters and their journeys.

Pot holders are back!

For many years, pot holders have been a fund raiser for every quilt show, and we are continuing the tradition for Quilt Show 2023. They are sold and priced as a pair, so please make pairs to donate for the good cause. A pair doesn't have to be 2 identical pot holders; often they are more interesting when they look similar but not exactly alike. Please use a layer of Insul-Bright and one or two layers of batting. This is a great way to use up scraps of fabric & batting. Size should be 9 inches or less. Potholders are not to be used in

microwave ovens since both Insul-Bright and many battings contain polyester.

Terese Pratt is contact for the project. She will have squares of Insul-Bright at Guild meetings and at many meetings at White Bluffs, or call at 509-591-1973.

In the past, squares and a roll of Insul-Bright were taken home, but haven't been returned. If you locate any squares among your stash, we'd appreciate you returning them or making up a pair of potholders! Thanks for your help!

The Round Tuit Donations Guide

The **Round Tuit** fundraiser, formerly known as the **Silent Auction**, is up and running for the 2023 Quilt Show. Co-chairs

the guidelines for this show fundraiser. The following quilt,



sewing, beading, and knitting donations *will* be accepted: Books, tools, fabric (all types and all sizes from scraps to yardage), yarn, thread, batting, rulers, UFO's, panels, lace, bias tape, buttons, sewing machines that work, antique sewing machines, sewing furniture, and containers.

Items *not* accepted are: magazines, looms, spindles, quilting frames, and modern sewing machines that don't work.

Items may be brought to the morning and evening meetings. Please thank Judy Gelhaus and Carol Capelle for donating their extra garage space to hold these treasures. There will be two sorting and pricing parties in the month before the show, one in Pasco and the other in Richland. These times will be announced closer to the show date, and the slots will be on the volunteer list.

It's time to edit your stash and bring joy to other quilters! And that joy you can buy at the *Round Tuit* sale.

Icymi: another quilt story full of serendipity ... from the August show & tell

Last spring, Geneva Carroll complained to Dana Pearson that she was in a creative slump. Dana's recommendation: "You've got a can of green beans in your pantry, right? It's for those emergencies when you can't think what to make for dinner; you just throw together a green bean casserole! That's what your stash is for: just get out some fabric and start sewing."

So Geneva did. She had two sets of charm squares she cut up and made a half-size version of Bonnie Hunter's Scrappy Trip Around the World. Then she bordered it with fabric she dyed at Jo's Dye Pot Studio (which is always full of happy reminiscence).

In search of a back, she found a print based on old recipe cards written in a variety of spidery scripts, complete with gravy stains. We've all got them. Geneva's are from her MIL. So her label says "Green Bean Casserole ... In memory of Ruth Carroll" and Geneva's got her groove back.

Many Moving Parts Maintain TCQG Raffle Quilt Tradition

Every June, when we have caught our breath and recovered from the current quilt show, the cogs and wheels start turning for the following year. Another raffle quilt has its debut, and ticket sales begin. The quilt and the tickets and the selling are part of a cycle that runs in counterpoint to the quilt show. In fact, autumn is the ideal time to start thinking about the quilt that will debut in June 2023 and go home with its winner in March 2024.

The current quilt, **Sew Many Strips**, was the product of panic: covid had cancelled our 2020 show, so the 2020 raffle segued into 2021. But no one had even mentioned a quilt for 2022. So the president made an executive decision: the Board approved APQ's homey, old-time pattern, and we would crowd-source fabric, collecting at the Community Service-sponsored tailgates. When the lockdowns were eased, we could get together to sew. (See The Quilter's Press Nov/Dec 2020, page 10).

On schedule, the marketing team took over – printing tickets, lining up venues and volunteers, and managing the logistics.

Now that the pandemic has become endemic, the raffle cycle can return to normal: an individual or a group can propose a quilt. Cheryl Garrison, Mark Palmer, and Sue White

have all contributed solo efforts; friendship groups like Make It Modern, the Bee at White Bluffs, Scrap Happens and Sew Scattered Stitchers and at least one ad hoc raffle quilt crew have also been responsible for designing and piecing. Fabric is sometimes gifted, sometimes purchased by the Guild (but we like to minimize our initial investment so as to maximize returns). Usually, a Guild long-armer offers quilting at a reduced rate.

On rare occasions, the creating group takes on the marketing and bookkeeping chores as well.

Some of our migrant members, who have experience in different guilds, refer to the raffle quilt as an "opportunity" quilt; the "opportunity" label is a great reminder of why we create an annual quilt and peddle it around the community. It IS a chance to increase our coffers (we are legally permitted to raise \$5,000 with a raffle), but more importantly, it makes an occasion to mingle with people who might not look or think like we do and share our craft, our art, and our organization.

If you're contemplating a raffle proposal, you should obtain Board approval before February 2023. If you are feeling entrepreneurial, there are experienced advisers and a notebook full of their accumulated wisdom.



White Bluffs Quilt Museum Offers Autumn Opportunities

Take in the third exhibit of the year, Quilts from Another Angle. Sign up for correlating classes —pickle dish (Eddie Walker will be back!), improv triangles, stitch & flip corners, crumb quilting, and more. Times still to be determined.

Meet your small group or teach a class on Fridays or Saturdays in the newly "remodeled" classroom (the bright room on the north side). With this additional work space, the Museum can welcome tourists and guests to the exhibit in the gallery AND let them look at quilters in action. Policy requires that members of groups that meet at the Museum be members of the Museum (\$25/year); also that regularly scheduled meetings may have to give up their time slot for educational programming.

Visit the library, drop off Round Tuit donations, shop, or come

with quilting questions during newly-added open hours – Monday, Tuesday, Thursday from 10 to noon. Regular groups meet at those times, and their conveners have been trained in the relevant procedures.

Teach a class! Cheryl Garrison is our education chair. Float your proposal; she'll ask for a syllabus, supply list, and sample, and she will help you book a time, fill out a class registration form, and figure a fee. The Board recently approved a change in its charges: the Museum will collect 25% of revenue from students; teachers take home 75%. In exchange, the Museum will register students and take pre-paid/nonrefundable payments. If time permits, it will advertise in the Guild and Museum newsletters.

TCQG's Quilt Shows are BACK!

We put on a wonderful show after the 2020 and 2021 cancellations due to Covid. We remembered the whole planning, publicizing, hanging, looking, shopping, voting, returning routine! The public was eager to participate – proven by the swarm of guests awaiting opening on Friday morning.

Lots of volunteers put in many hours to make the show a great success. Special appreciation is due for Geneva Carroll, who, as cochair in 2020, bolstered Candy Crandall as she was forced to cancel **Focus on the Stars**, then, as chair in 2021, called off the first edition of **Magic of the Stars**.

In honor of the show that fell victim to Covid, 23 quilts from **Focus on the Stars** were included in the theme category; the **Magic of Color** garnered 41 entries; members made 28 quilts for the **Black and White Challenge**; and there were 31 red and white quilts to celebrate the **Guild's 40th Birthday**.

Finances were rocky and complicated for two years due to refunds and payment rollovers, and lack of income (the show is our major fundraiser). The **Magic of Color** ended impressively in the black. Gross income during show days helped pay expenses, chiefly the \$18,027 bill for the Three Rivers Convention Center. Net profit was in the neighborhood of \$6,500.
