Dana Pearson recently moved her sewing studio from a bedroom to the basement because she needed to accommodate a second longarm. Her new Innova

is computerized, so she can now offer her Courageous Quilting clientele both computerized quilting and custom designs

simultaneously.



Almost 15 years into her career as a professional quilter, Dana recently took another brave step: she started a blog, where her

introduction declared, "Creativity takes courage" and "Growth happens at the edge of your comfort zone." She relishes challenge and variety: "My customers let me work on projects I wouldn't normally choose for myself," she says.

When it comes to piecing she prefers modern or improvisational designs in bright, contemporary fabrics. She is a founding member of the Make It Modern friendship group, where her colleagues depend on her upbeat en-"couragement."

Della Ward says quilting is her happy place; at the end of her working career, a crazy quilt restored her sanity. She values having something to show for her time: and she

enjoys the friendships formed in her small group, "Sew What."

Daughters of a seamstress, she and her sisters all became quilters. Their interests complement each other's particular focus: Della's favorite style is applique, another sister pieces, and the youngest owns a longarm. They have a history of block exchanges, fabric challenges and sister quilts, and they inspire each other.

Pinterest and the guild are other sources of ideas for Della. "I'm cheap. I don't like to pay for patterns," she says. From a picture,

she can reverse engineer the piecing directions.

She likes handwork although she has not quilted by hand since 1989. Her husband was on the night shift, and

she stitched up a Thousand Pyramid quilt - the "Night Shift" quilt. "And I did a pretty good job of preserving my points!"



JEAN ZOET ★★★★






Jean Zoet has an insatiable appetite for art, and is especially inspired by nature which she learned to appreciate growing up in Anacortes.

She started quilting before

the rotary revolution. With her interest in learning and experimentation, she completed projects in many traditional patterns and techniques. Then she was ready to move on. Not a linear person, she figured out ways to create swirly, circular,


more organic shapes. After cotton came wool and taffeta and silk and upholstery fabric. And embellishment. And dyeing, discharging, painting, and inking.





last year!). Like an impressionist painter. she loves to interpret photos in her work, and has learned to appreciate the Tsukineko inks techniques that can produce remarkable accuracy.

While she has moved away from piecing, Jean is still a quilter, honing her free motion style to use thread impressionistically, for artistic effect.











Cut the background color into two 3 %" strips, then cut each strip into 3 % x 3 %" squares (16 squares).



Next cut your purple and yellow 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " strips into four 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " rectangles.



Mark the diagonals of the wrong side of each background square. Then draw a second line $\frac{1}{2}$ " from the diagonal (2nd line is not shown in picture).

For EACH of the purple and yellow rectangles, place a background square, right sides together, aligned on top of one end and sew on both lines. Make sure the shorter line is to the outside. This method saves the outside piece as a smaller square instead of being waste. Cut between the two lines, press seams toward the corner and repeat on the opposite end. You will need four of these of each color. Save the cut off corners and turn them in for future projects.

TO PIECE THE BLOCK sew two of these new rectangle units together, as shown. Make four of these units and then piece them, first as rows, and then sew the two rows together to make your block.

Log Cabin variations a tribute to hearth & home



The Log Cabin is a well known block that has been used over and over in American quilting. It is traditionally made with a red center then sides or "logs" are added around the center. These were cut strips of light and dark scraps.

Since the small log cabins of early American history had one room with a fireplace for cooking and heat, life was lived in that room. The red square represents the fireplace, thus the red center then all the 'logs" were built around that square.


White Bluffs would like to invite you to tale part in its Log Cabin Challenge. Participants have until the first week of

August to put their rendition of the pattern together. The finished piece will need to be no larger than 20" x 20" and needs to be finished. The piece can be made with any

type of fiber, be it cotton, polyester, wood, yarn, old carpet or even weeds, for the adventurous. The patterns that are considered "log cabin" vary. These can include the pineapple block, wonky, half and straight furrow.

Bring finished quilts into the museum by Saturday, August 10. That day is a "Soup, News & Demo Day, so bring your blocks, your curiosity, and your appetite at noon to take part.

White Bluffs will hang all entries and ask that the public vote on their favorite. First, 2nd, and 3rd place winners will be announced Oct 19, during the Fiber Fest activities.



tradition — alphabet quilts for Bee babies began with pink and blue variations for Marti Cummings' twin grandkids. By now, it seems, the baby boom has ended: many grands and a few greats own Bee quilts.

From the beginning, the Bee committed to meeting weekly (to cultivate connection) without refreshments (to care for waistlines). When they discovered the joys of sewing together, they designated one, then two meetings a month as all-day sewcials, sometimes with lunch out, sometimes with potluck buffets. Lately, because nobody needs more fabric, the road trip days have turned into workshops — Judy Gelhaus coaching how to make a fractured quilt — or sweatshops — Barbara Atwell organizing an assembly line for community service quilts.

Because the door is always open at White Bluffs Ouilt Museum, the door is always open at the Bee. The member list now tops 20, and nearly half of them are transplants to the Tri Cities. It's a source of pride that the busy camaraderie can attract so many different tastes and talents. And a shock that ten years passed in such a flash of friendship. Time flies when you're having fun.
